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## **PROVENANCE:**

The digital files in this collection were copied from the administrative offices of the Salzburg Stiftung of the American Austrian Foundation, in Salzburg, Austria, and transferred to the Medical Center Archives, in October 2017, via <box.weill.cornell.edu>. A small selection of important paper materials (2.5 linear inches) was also photocopied from the Salzburg office at this time. Only files related to seminars directed by Weill Cornell faculty, and related to the overall program, were collected as part of this effort.

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## **ADMINISTRATIVE HISTORY:**

The Salzburg Weill Cornell Seminars began in 1993 as the Salzburg-Cornell Seminars, a collaboration between Weill Cornell Medicine and the American Austrian Foundation (AAF). The mission was to bring state-of-the-art medical knowledge to physicians from former Eastern Bloc countries. Austria was regarded as “a bridge between East and West,” a place where physicians from diverse national backgrounds could come together.

Funding for the seminars came from the Soros Foundations (later renamed the Open Society Institute, and in 2010 renamed the Open Society Foundations), with matching funds from the Austrian Federal Ministry for Education, Science and Culture.

The first directors of the seminar program were Wolfgang Aulitzky, MD, and David Mininberg, MD. Dr. Aulitzky has continued as the director of the seminars from their inception to the present (2018). As of 2018, he is the director of the Open Medical Institute (OMI) and the medical director of the American Austrian Foundation.

The first seminar, Cardiology, took place in November 1993, at the Schloss Leopoldskron in Salzburg. Dr. Stephen Scheidt was the Cornell course director, and Dr. Max Pichler was the Austrian co-director. The 57 physician Fellows came from 13 countries in Eastern Europe.

New seminar topics were added each year, with most taught by Weill Cornell faculty including affiliates at the Hospital for Special Surgery (bone and joint surgery) and Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center (oncology). The program expanded to include seminars conducted by faculty from several other academic medical centers, notably the Children’s Hospital of Philadelphia (pediatrics), Duke University (family medicine), the Cleveland Clinic (pathology and cardiac imaging), and Columbia University (maternal/infant health). Over time, the pool of fellows also expanded to include physicians practicing in “countries in transition” in Europe, Asia, Africa, and South America.

Building on the success of the seminars, the AAF developed additional medical programs. Those directly related to the seminars include the Satellite Symposia, in which Salzburg Seminar alumni teach courses in their home countries, and an exchange program of observerships that provide hands-on experience in Austrian hospitals for seminar alumni. In 2005, the Open Medical Institute (OMI) was established by The American Austrian Foundation, The Open Society Foundations, and the Austrian Federal Ministry of Science, Research and Economy to

unite the Salzburg Medical Seminars, Observerships, Satellite Symposia, and Visiting Professorships under one name.

The seminars were held in the Schloss Leopoldskron in Salzburg from 1993 through 2004. In 2001, the AAF purchased the Schloss Arenberg to provide a dedicated facility for the seminars. The Schloss Arenberg opened as the permanent home of the Salzburg Medical Seminars and the headquarters of the Salzburg Stiftung of the American Austrian Foundation in June 2005. In April 2009, Schloss Arenberg was almost completely destroyed by fire. During the reconstruction of Schloss Arenberg, seminars were held at Hotel Castellani in Salzburg. In April 2010 the newly-renovated Schloss Arenberg reopened.

As of 2018, the OMI presents 40 seminars per year and more than 20,000 physician fellows have attended the seminars since their inception in 1993.

Important dates:

**1984**

The American Austrian Foundation (AAF), Inc., New York, was established as a non-profit organization, with the mission to foster the relationship between the United States and Austria through exchanges in medicine, business, communications, and the arts.

**1990**

The AAF and Weill Cornell Medicine established the Humes Visiting Professorship, an exchange program between U.S. and Austrian physicians, funded by a bequest of WCM alumna and AAF trustee Jean Humes, M.D., in honor of her husband John P. Humes, a former U.S. Ambassador to Austria and the first president of the American Austrian Foundation.

**1993 November 15-19**

First Salzburg Cornell seminar, Cardiology, held in Schloss Leopoldskron. Stephen Scheidt was WCM Course Director. 57 physician fellows attended from 13 countries. Other WCM faculty included Jeffrey Borer, Richard Fuchs. Max Pichler was the Austrian co-director.

**1994 November 13-18**

1<sup>st</sup> Hospital for Special Surgery (HSS) seminar in Bone & Joint Surgery.

**1995**

Salzburg Stiftung of the American Austrian Foundation established: “an Austrian non-profit organization ... to facilitate the organization of AAF’s scientific programs in Austria.”

**1996**

The AAF began making seminar materials available electronically via CD-ROM. (see AAF Report 1995-96: “Salzburg Medical Seminars On-Line”.)

**1997 July 27-August 2**

1<sup>st</sup> Memorial Sloan Kettering seminar, Oncology.

**1997 November 18**

1<sup>st</sup> “Music for Medicine” benefit concert, performed by members of the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra, at Caspary Auditorium, Rockefeller University.

**1998 August**

American Austrian Foundation – Open Society Institute Medical Observership program launched.

**2000**

Satellite Symposia began.

**2001 August**

Salzburg Stiftung purchased Schloss Arenberg.

Gerhard Andlinger Chair for International Medicine and Distance Learning endowed at Weill Cornell.

**2004 August 20-26**

1<sup>st</sup> Weill Cornell-European School of Urology (ESU) Master Class in Urology.

**2005**

Open Medical Institute established. “The Open Medical Institute (OMI) was established in 2005 by The American Austrian Foundation, The Open Society Foundations and the Austrian Federal Ministry of Science, Research and Economy to unite all medical programs (Salzburg Medical Seminars, Observerships, Satellite Symposia, and Visiting Professorships) under one name.” (from AAF website)

**June**

Schloss Arenberg opened as center for Salzburg Medical Seminars. Seminar #158, Infectious Diseases, was the first seminar held in Schloss Arenberg.

**2006**

Dr. Wolfgang Aulitzky appointed the first Gerhard Andlinger Professor for Distance Learning and International Medicine at Weill Cornell.

**2009 April**

Schloss Arenberg destroyed by fire.

**2010**

Alianza Médica para la Salud (AMSA) founded by AAF Trustee Pablo Legorreta to fund Mexican physician’s participation in the Salzburg Medical Seminars.

**2010 April**

The newly-renovated Schloss Arenberg reopened.

## **SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE:**

This collection documents the work of the Salzburg Weill Cornell Seminars, from the program’s inception in 1993 until 2017, with the bulk of the materials from 1993 to 2007. Most of the collection comprises digital files, with the exception of 2.5 linear inches of paper files. It consists of the following series:

Series 1: Publications, reports, and historical materials (1995-2017)

Series 2: Newsletters (1994-2004)

Series 3: Seminar files (1993-2007)

Series 4: Group photographs (1993-2017, bulk 1993-1997)

Series 5: Lists (1996-2017)

The Seminar Files comprise the largest series (4,459 digital files), and the core of the collection. See the individual series notes for additional information.

## **CONDITIONS GOVERNING ACCESS:**

Some of the faculty and fellow presentations in the Seminar Files series contain Protected Health Information (PHI) and are subject to the HIPAA Privacy Rule. These files are noted in the folder list. Otherwise, the collection is open for research.

English (predominant) and German

Only records related to seminars conducted by Weill Cornell faculty, and to the overall program, were copied and transferred from the Salzburg office and included in this collection. The digital files in this collection are copies of files from the Salzburg office of the American Austrian Foundation (AAF). While only files related to the Salzburg Weill Cornell Seminars were copied for this collection, the AAF holds files on all of the Salzburg Medical Seminars, as well as related programs and the Open Medical Institute.

**Related Archival Materials (in the Medical Center Archives):**

The David Mininberg, MD, (1936-2013) Papers include materials from his work with the American Austrian Foundation and the Salzburg Seminars: 7 folders on the Salzburg Weill Cornell Seminars, and 4 folders on the Max Kade Fellowships, a related program of the AAF.

Salzburg Weill Cornell Seminars CD-ROMs: selected CD-ROMs published by the AAF, with seminar materials from 1993-1998 and 2008 collected from the Samuel J. Wood Library.

The Salzburg Weill Cornell Seminars Oral History Project: In 2018, oral history interviews were conducted with selected faculty, leadership, and other individuals who were instrumental in developing the seminars. The collection consists of digital audio and video files, and transcripts of the interviews.

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## BOX AND FOLDER LIST:

### Series 1: Publications, reports, and historical materials, 1995-2017, 2.5 linear inches (1 box) of paper materials; 114 Megabytes (6 PDFs, 1 mp4) of digital materials

This series includes both paper and digital files. The paper materials include annual reports, articles, booklets, brochures, correspondence, and minutes. The digital files include various publications about the Seminars, including reports, historical articles, and a video. The 1995-96 report of the American Austrian Foundation is especially useful, providing a comprehensive overview of the program from 1993-96, a list of all seminars 1993-1996, and a commentary on the program by George Soros; this report fills in gaps left by the lack of newsletters published in 1996. "Letters to George" is a compilation of letters from seminar faculty, fellows, and AAF board members, to funder George Soros on the occasion of his 85<sup>th</sup> birthday; these personal stories from faculty and fellows constitute a testimony on the impact of the program worldwide. The article by Richard Roberts provides historical perspective from his viewpoint as course director of the Infectious Diseases Seminar.

## Series 2: Newsletters, 1994-2004, 10 Megabytes (17 PDFs)

This series contains a continuous sequence of the *Salzburg Cornell Seminars Newsletter*, starting with the first issue in 1994 and ending with issue 2004/II, in which the title of the newsletter changed to the *American Austrian Foundation, Inc. Medical Program Newsletter*. The title change indicates a widening in scope of the Newsletter, to encompass all of the medical programs of the AAF, not merely the seminars.

The Newsletters provide excellent contextual and historical information about the seminar program throughout its first 10 years. The earliest issues contain background on the program, its mission, and its funders. The first issue provides a report on the first seminar in Cardiology, including a complete list of participants. Several issues include lists of the seminars conducted in a given year, with selected group photographs. The *Newsletters* also cover updates on fundraising, expansions to the program, and related activities such as the Satellite Symposia.

The title of the newsletter changed throughout its run, and the publication schedule varied from year to year. No issues were published in 1996 (though comparable information is presented in the 1995-96 report of the American Austrian Foundation, in the Publications series). In 2002, only a special, unnumbered “Benefit Edition” was published.

### **Series 3 Seminar files, 1993-2007, 15.6 gigabytes (4,459 digital files)**

This series, arranged chronologically, contains the working files for seminars taught by Weill Cornell Medical College faculty from 1993 through 2007. Seminars conducted by other institutions are omitted from this collection, accounting for some of the gaps in numbering sequence. Each digital folder listed below contains files from a specific seminar (often arranged in subfolders), including (but not limited to) course materials, biographical information on faculty, presentation slides, lists of participants, schedules and logistical information. File formats include Word documents, Excel spreadsheets, PowerPoint slides, PDF files, and various image and video formats.

The folder list below lists file names of the digital folders as assigned by the records creators; this accounts for the inconsistency in capitalization and file naming conventions. Digital folder names for seminars 001SCS through 164SCS did not include the seminar titles, so the archivist devised the titles for those seminars, informed by the materials. Beginning with seminar 191SCS Ob Gyn, digital folder names include partial or full seminar titles. Dates in the folder list are the dates that the seminars took place. The materials are predominantly in English, though some file names are in German. There were several seminars for which digital files were not available, and these gaps are noted in the folder list.

Some of the files from presentations contain images with explicit depictions of human anatomy, disease conditions, injuries, or surgical procedures.

Some files contain Protected Health Information (PHI) in the form of patient names, identifiers, or images, and are restricted by the HIPAA Privacy Rule. Folders containing files with PHI are noted in red in the list below.
